7.1.3 GLEN WAVERLEY CIVIC PRECINCT PROJECT - OUTCOME OF COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

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RECOMMENDATION

That Council

- Notes that community consultation on the detailed design (Milestone 3A) of the Glen Waverley
 Civic Precinct has been completed in accordance with Council's decision at its meeting on 27 May
 2025 and which consultation occurred between 23 June 2025 and 27 July 2025 (5 weeks duration)
 via:
 - a) an on-line survey focusing on the design via ShapeMonash.
 - b) letters to residents and schools in postcode 3150.
 - c) article in the July edition of The Bulletin distributed throughout the municipality;
 - d) Project team attendance at meetings of Council's various Advisory Committees; and
 - e) a public drop-in session on 8 July 2025 at the Glen Waverley Library.

(collectively "community consultation").

There were 2,355 visitors to the ShapeMonash page and 150 contributions to the survey including a total of 107 contributions from the community to survey question 6. There were 3 written submissions received by email and an additional 6 responses to the survey completed by visitors to the library. The outcomes of the community consultation are contained in this report and the Attachments.

- 2. Notes that the predominant themes that emerged from the community consultation were:
 - a) Design, Brickwork and colour scheme
 - b) Uses of the Building
 - c) Parking and Accessibility
 - d) Sustainability
- 3. Agrees to progress to the next steps of the project which are:
 - a) Finalising the design (which will include providing the architect with the community's feedback for consideration of any changes, where appropriate) and preparing and releasing tender documents for the early works package which includes a new sub-station and relocation of the diesel generator which is programmed to be completed prior to the demolition of the library.
 - b) Progressing Milestone 3B, preparing and lodging an application for a planning permit for works within the Heritage Overlay (HO71).
 - c) Progressing Milestone 4, construction contract and tender documentation.

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this report is to present to Council the outcome of community consultation on the Glen Waverley Civic Precinct Project (Project). The report recommends proceeding with the process for the

early works including relocation of the sub-station and diesel generator, progressing Milestone 3B being the planning permit application and Milestone 4 – Contract / construction documentation.

COUNCIL PLAN STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES

Inclusive Services

Renew our community assets to deliver contemporary services.

BACKGROUND

This Project has been considered by Council on a number of occasions, over a number of years as it has progressed through each design stage.

More recently, Council at its meeting of 27 May 2025, amongst other matters, resolved as follows:

- "2. Note that there are five Milestones to be completed during the life of this Project (as shown in Table 1 in this report) and that Milestones 1, 2 and 3A have been completed.
- 4. Resolves and adopts the Milestone 3A Summary Report at Attachment 1, inclusive of the recommended design outcome for community consultation in accordance with Council's Community Engagement Policy and Framework to seek community views on the project with a report on the feedback received to be presented to a future Council meeting for consideration.
- 5. Notes that with Milestones 1-3A completed, Council will, following the community consultation, consider moving to the next steps of the Project which are:
 - a. progressing Milestone 3B, preparing and lodging an application for a planning permit for works within the Heritage Overlay (HO71);
 - b. progressing Milestone 4, contract documentation and a tender for construction; and
 - c. in due course consideration of a report to award a tender for construction to commence. "

DISCUSSION

Community consultation on the Project occurred between 23 June and 27 July 2025 for a 5 week period.

The focus of the consultation this time, was the change and evolution of the design and its simplification, the flexible and configurable spaces, the green space as well as seeking specific feedback on the look and feel of the design.

Community Engagement Activities

The engagement activities included:

- 1. **ShapeMonash consultation** Release of the Milestone 3A Summary Report and seeking specific feedback via a survey which asked six questions around the following topics:
 - How they would like to see the outdoor space activated;
 - What type of events they would like to see provided in the Civic Hall and other meeting places;
 - How people would like to experience the internal areas and what do they think of the design;
 - Questions specific to how children and young people may experience the areas;
 - Thoughts generally on the design and the colour of the façade of the building; and
 - any other feedback.


ShapeMonash also included a 360° walk through video of the design, which was narrated by members of the Monash Youth Committee, a document library of Council's history of decision making and the ability for the community to share their ideas on the design with imagery.

Attachment 1 – Re-Imagining Glen Waverley - Consultation Report presents a summary of the results from the ShapeMonash page including the contributions to survey questions 1-5.

Attachment 2 – Feedback and Responses provides the contributions from the community to survey question 6 "Other Feedback", plus those received via mail, the Monash Youth Committee and the 6 survey forms completed by visitors to the Library, along with officer's responses.

- 2. A letter was distributed to all residences and schools in Glen Waverley, (postcode 3150) directing people to view the material on the ShapeMonash page with the ability to provide feedback in the survey or via mail@monash. The letter was also translated into Chinese for the benefit of Chinese traders in Glen Waverley.
- 3. A public drop-in session was held on Tuesday 8 July 2025 between 4:30pm and 7:00pm at the Glen Waverley Library. Council Officers and representatives from Lyons Architecture and Currie & Brown Quantity Surveyors were available to answer questions from attendees. Approximately 35 people attended the session.
- 4. Meetings occurred with the following advisory committees:
 - Reconciliation Action Plan Advisory Committee on 17th June
 - Disability Advisory Committee on 19th June
 - Positive Ageing Reference Group on 26th June
 - LGBTIQA+ Advisory Committee on 30th June
 - Gender Equity Advisory Committee on 4th August
 - Multicultural Advisory Committee on 7th August
 - Environmental Advisory Committee on 11th August
- 5. Posters were placed in our libraries advertising the consultation.
- 6. An article was placed in the July edition of the Monash Bulletin distributed to all households in Monash on 16 June 2025 (refer image 1 below).
- 7. The consultation was promoted on social media.

Key Messaging

The key messaging used for the project was:

a. What is driving this project?

Glen Waverley will change and grow over the coming years, with the SRL making it easier for people to travel here and experience everything that makes it a special place to live, work and visit. Our new Glen Waverley Civic Precinct will play a huge part in that.

b. Why do we need a new library

Our Glen Waverley library building was built in 1976, with one major refurbishment since. Like any building of that age, it has residual wear, tear and damage.

As the busiest branch of our five Monash public libraries, the building is frequented by students from nearby schools and people who live and work in Glen Waverley and other suburbs. The building struggles to meet what people expect from a modern library, and the new library will include flexible spaces and equipment that support contemporary technology for creative thinking and learning.

Some of the features in the new library design include:

- Spaces for small groups to meet and collaborate.
- Meeting rooms and quiet reading and study areas.
- Dedicated spaces for teenagers and smaller children.
- The ability to house a much large collection of books and our growing Library of Things.
- Exhibition and event spaces.

c. Why do we need new Council events and office space?

Our existing Council buildings do not have space for large civic events and ceremonies such as our citizenship ceremonies, and we also lease office space for council staff in a nearby Glen Waverley building for staff accommodation.


d. How long will the project take?

The next stage of detailed design and, subject to Council endorsement, we expect to proceed to tendering for construction in the 2026/27 financial year.

A timeline for construction will be finalised as part of the tendering process, we anticipate this would take approximately two years. We will look at alternatives in the local area for some of the library functions during the construction period, it will however be a smaller reduced level of service. This is yet to be resolved.

ShapeMonash Results

At the close of consultation on 27th July, the results from the ShapeMonash page are shown in the graph below:



The full result is provided in **Attachment 1 –Re-Imagining Glen Waverley - Consultation Report.**

As can be seen from the above graph, there was a high level of views and visits to the ShapeMonash page, with 150 contributions (from 129 unique contributors).

The most downloaded document was the facade development study.

Responses to Survey Questions

There were 6 questions that made up the ShapeMonash survey which are listed in Table 1 below.

Officers' reviewed all contributions to the 6 questions to identify sentiment. As mentioned above, the list of responses to Q1-5 are listed in Attachment 1 and the list of responses to Q6 – Other Feedback (together with officers' responses) are listed in Attachment 2.

Other Feedback

6 feedback forms were completed at the public drop-in session and handed to officers in attendance who added these to the ShapeMonash Survey. These are included in the 107 responses referred to above:

- 3 responses were received via mail at Monash; and
- A further 6 feedback forms were completed by visitors to the Glen Waverley Library following the
 drop-in session and post closure of the ShapeMonash Page on 27 July. Given the completion date,
 they are not included in 107 responses referred to above, but have been included in Attachment 2.

All of the above responses are all included in Attachment 2–Feedback and Responses.

Public Drop in Session

Approximately 35 people attended the public drop-in session on 8 July 2025. Attendees were able to view the design and all supporting information as well as ask questions of the architect and officers. Key themes in the questions raised related to:

- parking,
- impacts during construction including site access and duration,
- continuity of library services during construction,
- the evolution of the development of the design since Schematic Design, and
- seeking more information about the layout of the new library and civic hall and the activities they could support.

Other matters raised were not directly related to the project and included future plans for Kingsway and the impact of the SRL project.

Attendees were encouraged to provide feedback on ShapeMonash or fill out feedback forms (containing the 6 ShapeMonash survey questions).

Advisory Committees

As outlined above, officers attended meetings with a number of advisory committees:

The Project was discussed and presented to the various committees and they were advised on the information available on Councils website and to provide feedback about the Project.

Meetings with the Disability Advisory Committee have been held along the journey of this Project on a number of occasions and there is a good understanding of the vision for this Project. Whilst there were no concerns raised from this Committee, a question was raised around assisting visually impaired people to access information on the Project such as a tactile model. This question resulted in officers' including a narration by the Monash Youth Committee to the 360° flythrough, as there was insufficient time to produce and provide a tactile model.

At the meeting with the LGBTIQA+, a question was raised relating to the number of meeting rooms and explanation was provided regarding the purpose of this Project to provide a variety of meeting spaces for community use.

The Multicultural Advisory Committee discussed various aspects of the Project including sustainability, public art, programming and multicultural representation in signage. The inclusion of a prayer room was welcomed and they discussed the importance of spaces that support both individual cultural celebrations and incorporation of cross-cultural spaces for gatherings.

Officers' Analysis of Responses provided during the consultation

Some of the key or repeated commentary received in the responses to questions 1-6 and reflected in the sentiment in Table 1 above related to:

• There were a diverse range of views on the design of the building, its façade and colours. Whilst there were many positive comments received to the design some did comment that they thought the building materials didn't integrate well with its surroundings, the building should more closely reflect the Civic Centre building and that the colour palette was dated or bland. Conversely, there was appreciation for the natural and earthy tones as it felt warm and inviting and comments such as "flexibility and inviting look of the interiors" and "natural lighting, smart design based around natural light and direction of sun and wind".

- Positive comments were made in regard to accessibility with the wide pathways that accommodate
 wheelchair and pram access. Comments were also received regarding safety hazards and that the
 design should continue to explore sensory friendly features and for Council to ensure navigation clarity
 with clear signage.
- Positive comments were received supporting the provision of both quiet and active zones and a desire for blending indoor and outdoor environments, with atriums and green corridors. The curves and organic shapes were seen as enhancing the building's character. Conversely, some commented that the layout seemed confusing and that it didn't look like a library.
- There was strong support for the multipurpose spaces and lots of suggestions made for the types of
 events the community would like to see from hosting workshops, performances, meetings and youth
 activities. Comments were made requesting a larger stage and a hall that supported more production
 related music performances.
- Sustainability came through strongly in the feedback and in particular interest in the provision of solar panels, rooftop gardens, use of natural materials, suggestions for shaded windows, passive cooling and energy-efficient design.
- Comments were also received relating to car parking, whether it is sufficient and the provision of more
 as well as general commentary on the extent of development within the Glen Waverley Activity
 Centre.

Given the nature of the questions asked, a neutral sentiment was also received and in particular, it should be I noted from questions 1, 3 and 6 that the neutral sentiment was high. The type of feedback received in these instances were often those that asked questions of the design such as "Will there be a suitable space for....", or suggestions such as "limit parking in surrounding streets".

From all the commentary received, four main themes emerged:

- 1. Design, brickwork and colour scheme
- 2. Uses of the Building
- 3. Parking and Accessibility
- 4. Sustainability

These are discussed in more detail below.

Theme 1: Design, Brickwork and Colour Scheme

The Project has been shaped by extensive consultation with the project team, heritage and traditional owner consultants, technical analysis, and a commitment to creating a civic identity that is both contemporary and welcoming. The architectural approach balances the need for a distinctive civic presence with sensitivity to the surrounding context, including the adjacent Harry Seidler-designed Civic Centre and the broader Glen Waverley Activity Centre.

The building's form is deliberately dynamic, with curved elements and a varied façade that respond to the unique conditions of the site. This approach softens the building's presence, improves pedestrian experience, and creates a more inviting frontage along Kingsway and Springvale Road.

The use of brick as a primary material was selected for its durability, low maintenance, and ability to age gracefully within the local climate. The brickwork is complemented by a palette of natural materials and soft tones, which together create a warm and accessible environment. The design team has carefully considered the balance between modern aesthetics and the need for the building to integrate with its surroundings. While some community members have expressed a preference for lighter or more neutral colours, the chosen palette aims to reflect the natural landscape and provide a sense of continuity with

existing civic buildings. Bricks also offer the unique opportunity of specialized handcrafting into one of a kind patterns, emphasizing the act of weaving as an inclusive metaphor across many different cultures.

Internally, the design prioritises openness, flexibility, and natural light. Large glazed openings and clear sightlines enhance transparency and connectivity between indoor and outdoor spaces. The internal layout includes a mix of open and enclosed areas to support a variety of uses, from quiet study to community gatherings. The design also incorporates green spaces and landscaping, both indoors and outdoors, to create a welcoming and vibrant atmosphere.

The project has undergone multiple rounds of value management to ensure cost efficiency without compromising on design quality. Adjustments have been made to simplify certain architectural features for cost efficiencies while delivering long-term community benefit. The design has been reviewed by experienced professionals and subject to rigorous governance processes, ensuring it meets contemporary standards for functionality, accessibility, and sustainability.

We acknowledge that design preferences are subjective and that not all community members will agree on every aspect of the building's appearance. However, the final design reflects a careful balance of stakeholder input, technical requirements, and the aspiration to create a civic landmark that will serve Glen Waverley for generations to come.

In addition to the aesthetic considerations, the design team has also prioritized sustainability in the selection of materials and finishes. The aim is that the brickwork will be sourced from local suppliers, reducing the carbon footprint associated with transportation, and the use of low-VOC (volatile organic compound) paints and finishes will contribute to improved indoor air quality.

As with the previous consultation, the design and colours were always expected to create the most discussions and be the most polarising issue. As with a diverse range of views and whilst it is not possible to satisfy or appease everyone, for the reasons outlined above, it is felt that the design and colour palette strikes the right balance and is the right response for the site. Accordingly, whilst enhancements and improvements will be considered as we move to the next stages of the project the design is proposed to remain largely unchanged.

Theme 2: Uses of the Building

Council is committed to delivering on its promise to provide more community spaces and also managing the Project's costs carefully.

The Project has been designed to deliver a flexible, multi-purpose facility that meets the evolving needs of the Monash community. The Project will house a new library, a multipurpose civic hall, community meeting rooms, Council service areas, and extensive landscaped public spaces.

The library remains at the heart of the Project, with a strong focus on supporting traditional library functions—such as access to books and quiet study—while also embracing contemporary needs. The design includes dedicated quiet study zones, flexible seating arrangements, and technology-enabled spaces to support students, lifelong learners, and community groups. Maker spaces, digital access zones, and sound studios are incorporated to foster creativity and innovation. The children's area features an amphi-theatre-style layout, reading nooks, and direct access to outdoor play spaces, supporting family-friendly experiences and encouraging curiosity.

The civic hall is designed as a versatile venue capable of hosting a wide range of events, from citizenship ceremonies and community meetings to performances and exhibitions. The hall features movable walls and flexible seating to accommodate different event formats and group sizes. Additional meeting rooms and multipurpose spaces are available for community hire, supporting local clubs, cultural groups, and educational activities.

While a café is not included, the ground floor layout allows for a future café should Council decide to include one, and the Project is well-connected to nearby retail and hospitality offerings. Landscaped public

spaces, including the civic plaza and garden zones, provide opportunities for informal gatherings, relaxation, and outdoor events.

Accessibility and inclusivity have been central to the design process. The building includes multiple lifts, accessible toilets, and wayfinding features to ensure all members of the community can use the facility. The design also supports culturally inclusive programming, with flexible spaces suitable for social gatherings, cultural events, and informal meetups.

The current design proposed all-gender toilet facilities throughout the building. In further exploring the provision of toilets within the building, the National Construction Code (NCC) was referred to. The NCC requires a certain number of designated toilet facilities that are labelled male and female. Speaking with Council's Building Unit, it was confirmed that under the NCC any all-gender toilet facilities should be provided in addition to the minimum requirements of male and female toilet facilities required to be provided under the NCC.

Whilst we are aware that all-gender toilet facilities do exist at some hospitals and schools. Being State Government buildings whilst they must have regard to the NCC under the Building Act 1993, they are not required to achieve strict compliance. A Council has differing requirements, in that it must achieve strict compliance with the NCC and the Building Act 1993. Whilst it would be open to Council to explore a performance solution to deviate from the NCC requirements, advice received was that this would be unlikely to be approved. Accordingly, it is proposed to provide toilets in accordance with the Building Act 1993/NCC requirements and seek to incorporate additional toilet facilities that would be all-gender. The design and number of additional toilets will be determined during the next design milestone.

We recognise that some community members have requested additional facilities, such as a dedicated youth centre, indoor sports areas, or a rooftop garden. These are items outside of the scope of the Project and the Monash Youth Space is provided at Level 1 Euneva and space for youth formed a major part of this Project.

While feedback was received regarding larger musical performances / productions, the hall was intentionally designed as a civic space to support broad community use such as citizenship ceremonies, presentations and pop-up events rather than a dedicated theatre venue. The decision not to include full performing arts infrastructure was based on functionality, cost and availability of nearby bookable venues (for example Robert Blackwood Hall at Monash University or Huntingtower Performing Art School) that are equipped to host such performances, avoiding unnecessary duplication.

Theme 3: Parking and Accessibility

Council recognises that convenient access and adequate parking are essential for the success of the Project and the broader Glen Waverley Activity Centre (GWAC) and parking and accessibility have been key considerations in the design process.

Accessibility

The Project site is located close to the existing Glen Waverley train station, major bus routes, and the future Suburban Rail Loop Station. These combine to provide a wealth of sustainable travel options, helping to reduce motor vehicle traffic volumes and the need for large areas set aside for car parking in the GWAC.

For people accessing the site from Kingsway, the public realm has been carefully designed to ensure all areas are accessible for all users, with generous pathways, clear sightlines and wayfinding.

<u>Car Parking - Numbers</u>

The delivery of a future focused, but appropriate car parking provision was a key focus of the Project. This included ensuring that the Project provided for the current 117 public car parking spaces, and that there be a no net reduction in car spaces. These 117 public car parking spaces are provided through 79 spaces in a

single level basement (for longer term stays) and 38 spaces at grade (for shorter term stays). It should also be noted that until recently, approximately 45 car spaces were reserved for Councils staff during business hours, Monday to Friday and these have been moved off site and will not return. Therefore there is a net increase in available public car parking during business hours for visitors.

The onsite provision of 117 public spaces is bolstered by the completion of the extension to the Bogong Avenue Car park (500 additional spaces resulting in a total of more than 1,000 spaces).

An independent assessment of car parking provision for the Project confirms that the parking provided on site is appropriate for the proposed building and as part of the wider GWAC network that includes the recent Bogong Avenue extension, and additional car parking that is to be provided by the Suburban Rail Loop Authority (SRLA) as part of their Project.

The car parking provided on site and in the broader GWAC is considered adequate to meet the demands on the new building.

Car Parking - Accessibility & Sustainability

The Project includes sufficient parking spaces to serve the use of the building. The Project also includes designated areas for people with mobility challenges, electric vehicle charging stations, and bicycle racks.

Through the provision of at-grade and basement parking, accessible spaces located near lifts and entrances, the Project provides convenient access to the building, with clear signage and pathways to guide visitors. These measures will ensure that the building and the precinct are inclusive and welcoming for all members of our community.

Car Parking – other issues

Council continues to work closely with the SRLA to secure further public parking in the GWAC. The new owner of the Central Car Park is also required to retain public car parking on site until construction begins. These measures are part of a broader strategy to manage parking demand across the GWAC, particularly during peak periods and major events.

We acknowledge that some community members have expressed concerns about potential congestion, the adequacy of parking during peak times, and the impact of increased housing density in the area. Council will continue to monitor parking demand and work with relevant authorities to ensure that the precinct remains accessible and functional as the community grows.

Theme 4: Sustainability

Council is committed to delivering a precinct that demonstrates leadership in environmental performance, resilience, and long-term value for the community.

The design incorporates a range of sustainability features aimed at reducing the building's environmental footprint and supporting Council's net zero targets. Key initiatives include the use of energy-efficient systems, high-performance glazing, and extensive natural ventilation to manage temperature extremes and reduce energy consumption. The building envelope is designed to minimise heat gain and loss, with shading devices, insulated panels, and motorised blackout blinds to control lighting and thermal comfort.

Solar panels are included as part of the Project's sustainability features, providing renewable energy and contributing to long-term operational savings. The design also allows for future adaptability, with provisions for additional solar infrastructure and other upgrades as technology evolves. Water-sensitive urban design (WSUD) elements are integrated throughout the precinct, including planted landscaped edges, tree pits with passive irrigation, and dry creek planting to manage stormwater and support urban cooling.

The landscape design emphasises the use of native species, which are well-adapted to the local climate and soil, reducing maintenance costs and supporting biodiversity. The project aims to achieve a 30% tree canopy cover by 2040, enhancing the ecological value of the precinct and contributing to urban cooling.

Materials have been selected for their durability, low embodied energy, and potential for recycling or reuse at the end of their life cycle.

Sustainability has also guided the approach to demolition and construction. Where possible, materials from the existing buildings will be salvaged and reused, minimising waste and supporting circular economy principles. The design team has worked closely with specialist consultants to ensure that the building meets or exceeds relevant environmental standards, including Green Star certification.

We acknowledge that some community members have requested additional features, such as rooftop gardens, exterior panels with moss or climbing plants, and more extensive use of timber as a structural material. While these are not included in the current scope, the design prioritises flexibility and future adaptability, ensuring the precinct can evolve in response to changing community needs and advances in sustainable design.

Milestone 3B and 4

Having completed community consultation, the report recommends that Council resolve to proceed with Milestone 3B being the planning permit application and Milestone 4 – Contract / construction documentation.

As noted in the 27 May 2025 report to Council, the planning permit is regarding those works relating to the changed vehicle access to the Civic Centre, part of the covered link between the two buildings and part of the proposed basement for the Project where these cross over into the Heritage Overlay.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Council has previously allocated a capital budget expenditure for the consultancy / design work of \$8,000,000. The design/consultancy phase of the Project is tracking within the approved budget.

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

really. It's essentially fortress-like. There's very little communication between the outside and the inside and that's a shame.

I see in these images no separation of 'activities' and reading areas that are and should be very different and discrete. It's great that libraries are building their relevance to the community with the library of things, and public talks and meetings and lessons and seminars, all of that. But I don't see the primary purpose of a library honoured in any of these images, that being to provide equitable access to all in the community, regardless of financial status, to literature. I don't see amenity for readers in any of these images. There's way too much wasted space, as if broad thoroughfares for traffic and huge staircases were preeminently desirable for the life of the building. As if transit were the main anticipated activity of all. There should be heaps of seating in these transit areas so that youngsters have somewhere casual to congregate and chatter, or people have somewhere to sit and wait for friends or take shelter from the elements for a little while, or rest after walking the length of Kingsway. I hate to have to remind people, but we're not all always on the move. We are humans and often need to sit and just be. And then there is the vital core of us who are readers seeking immersion in the world of the written word.

We need lots of quiet nooks, couch-like seats with high backs under north-facing windows with views of greenery. Places with corners we can nestle into, not full of passing traffic and talking groups. We want quiet. The space should be honeycombed with cosy smaller areas full of soft seats, with surprises around each corner, fun to explore and gentle on the psyche. The core library should not be a huge open panopticon with a surveilling control centre with an ugly wall keeping visitors outside and at a lower level. Staff should be seen/perceived to be welcoming and accessible, not isolated in a forbidding visual cylinder.

The main library should have big 'QUIET PLEASE' signs everywhere, and there should be pleasant, acoustically closed areas for meeting and chatting and collaboration on projects that are visually within the main space but very clearly separate.

There are few places left in the world where people can find refuge

above.

Regarding the library layout and amenity, the design includes acoustically separated areas for reading, collaboration, and community programming. Quiet zones, soft seating, and informal gathering spaces are integrated to support comfort and accessibility. The layout aims to balance open circulation with spaces for immersion and rest.

The library's core function—to provide equitable access to literature and learning—remains central to the design. Staff areas are positioned to be welcoming and accessible, and the layout supports both visibility and privacy.

While a rooftop park is not part of the current proposal, the precinct includes significant green infrastructure and tree retention strategies. The building's form balances civic presence with openness, and the curved façade elements are part of a broader strategy to soften the streetscape and improve pedestrian experience. The Library is designed to be easily navigable, inclusive, and responsive to the diverse ways people use public space.

The Glen Waverley Civic Precinct is a long-term investment in community infrastructure. The current library is approaching end of life and is serving a much larger population than it was designed for. The project has been carefully costed and phased to ensure financial sustainability, with funding from land sales and budget allocated across multiple budget cycles. Previous Council reports have discussed this matter.

Council is very mindful of the hardships of many of its residents, and this project provides much needed community infrastructure for the Glen Waverley area. Funding for this project will not divert financial resources from Council's other priorities.

Our aim is to provide a library that meets community needs, both now and into the future and optimise community participation. Books remain a significant portion of the collection to be accommodated at this point in time and consume the large proportion of the library area but shelving will be provided in spaces that are adaptable to changing needs as technology and usage patterns change. The library will contain a variety of spaces for programs from story times, conversation circles and book clubs to maker spaces, training programs, public PC use, gaming, sound recording and podcasting. The library service is responsive to community expectations so flexibility has been a key consideration in the design of the building.

The function of the Civic Hall is to cater for a diverse range of community based activities from citizenship ceremonies, large gatherings, corporate conferences, school groups, live performances including music, speaking events and pop-up events. This can include theatrical performances but not to the scale you are envisaging, several facilities are located within Monash that offer full scale theatrical performances such as Robert Blackwood Hall at Monash University. The hall will have a flat floor with a demountable stage. No fly towers and staging gear is included.
